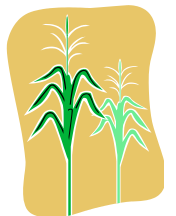

Not sure what potatoes to plant??

Kennebecs are a white potato. They have very smooth, thin skin, which makes them very easy to peel and excellent to use for cooking. They mature late, but keep well over the winter.

Yukon Golds are a medium sized yellow potato excellent for boiled or baked. They are excellent in soups or potato pancakes!

Russets have a thick skin, few eyes, and are a bigger potato. They are best for baking, but are also good for making French fries and mashed potatoes.

Red Chieftans are a medium sized red potato that has some immunity to late blight, medium resistance to common scab, and resistance to stem end browning. Chieftans have an excellent quality after boiling.

Red Pontiacs have thin red skin, shallow eyes, and a sweet white flesh. They keep very well over the winter. Red Pontiacs are excellent for boiling, baking, mashing, and roasting. They do not make very good potatoes for frying.

Red Norlands are excellent for baking a boiling. Matures mid season. They are an extra large potato with thin skin and few eyes. This potato also shows good resistance to scab.

Side note: You should avoid eating potatoes that have a greenish tinge to them, as they can contain a natural toxin known as [solanine](#) that can be harmful in large amounts. Store potatoes in the dark to prevent them from turning green. If you do find greenish spots on your potatoes, peel or cut away the green parts before cooking them.

How to Grow Seed Potatoes:

Space potatoes a foot apart in rows that are 2 – 3 ft apart.

Avoid fresh manure and lime in the soil where potatoes are to be grown, as it tends to cause scab. Average soil is fine and add 5-10-10 or 10-20-20 fertilizer. Mix the fertilizer into the soil prior to planting.

Harvest new young potatoes when the plants begin to flower or for storage of full size potatoes, harvest when the vines turns yellow or have died back.
